Siblings of Jesus Series

Seven gods Worshipped by the Modern World

[18] Fifth god - Food/Drink

A Latin adage says: "Non vivimus edere sed edimus vivere" (we do not live to eat but we eat to live). Unfortunately, the reversal of this adage is a reality seen in today and we often find ourselves guilty of this, hence making food and drink a god. Man has enthroned his stomach and dethroned God who created his whole being including his stomach. Man worships his belly more than his God by greed which motivates gluttony and drunkenness.

There is nothing wrong with eating and drinking. What becomes wrong is our bad attitude towards such. And this bad attitude causes a factor of negligence - indifference to the hungry, the needy and the poor around us. In these poor people, Jesus identifies with them that when we help any of them we do it unto Him because they are His brethren (see Matt 25:40), and validates this by reminding us that we shall always have the poor in our midst (see Matt 26:11). The presence of poor brethren should remind us that it is sinful to waste food for that food never belonged to us. It also warns us that gluttony is a sin for it causes us to eat what never belonged to us, but to others, even when we possess it, for in the exhortation of St John Chrysostom, whatever we have in our possession which we don't make use of never belonged us, but to the needy. Mother St Teresa of Calcutta adds that poverty, on this account, was what man created for others by neglecting the need of his neighbors.

In fact, St Thomas Aquinas in explaining the cardinal virtue of temperance, presents it as a virtue of moderation which enables us to tame and be in control of our appetite and passion. On this he teaches that gluttony is not only about how much we eat and drink, but also how (the manner by which) we eat or drink, and even great attachment to a particular thing we eat or drink (see Summa Theologiae, part II-II, question 148; see also questions 141 and 148), for we can practice self-denial by denying ourselves sometimes those things in order for others to benefit from them. In a word, detachment from such attachments make us more charitable.

Gluttony and drunkenness make us look like two persons, Jesus tells us about in the Gospels: the rich fool (see Luke 16:19-31) and the Prodigal son (see Luke 15:11-32). Like the former it makes us insensitive to the needs of our neighbors, hence, being guilty of sin of omission, and like the latter, it blinds our senses, hence being guilty of sin of commission. Our attachment to excessive eating and drinking weakens our disposition to relate with God in prayer. There is something of a lack of temperance here. This is why fasting is important to instill discipline in us. The truth about gluttony/ drunkenness is that it blindfolds us from seeing the needs of our neighbors especially those who have no hope for the next meal. It is an omission which must be included in our daily examination of conscience. To bear this in mind will prevent one from committing other sins attached to it, and most importantly, to help us understand that happiness is never found in material pleasure. This compels us to hear Jesus' call to us to come to him, so as to move our hearts towards charity. He is present in every needy person. He is present in those who give with love and present also in the needy who receive in gratitude.
