

[26] How to Console those who Grieve

In a funeral ceremony of man held in his village, the wife cried so bitterly to the point of tiredness. She was so pained by her husband's death, that people had to stay with her for a week to make sure she recovered from the shock. Among her four kids comprising of 2 boys and 2 girls, three of them went home for the funeral and burial, while the other, one of the boys did not bother to attend. His reason was that there was no need since he didn't have affection for his dad when he was alive. He had been in enmity with his dad because he reprimanded him for his evil and immoral way of life. So he hated him even to the point of hardening his heart not to pay him last respect.

Two things that stand out in the above story are grief and indifference. The man's wife was grieving while his son was indifferent to the pains of death. This is also the case with many families around the world today. Grief is a universal reality that cannot be escaped by mankind because it is in the nature of humans to mourn and cry. What is important is not only the act of grief but our attitude and manner towards that. Each time people cry during funerals, burials and news of death of a loved one, we must be moved to compassion like Jesus our Brother did. It was His compassion that enabled Him to raise Lazarus back to life (see John 11:1-44), and to stop a funeral procession to raise the son of the woman of Naim and gave him back to her (see Luke 7:11-17). What we see in Jesus' examples, even though, they are miracles, yet they underscore the presence of compassion. Without compassion, He wouldn't have been moved to do such wonders.

Grief happens at any time, and people grieve differently. Some persons grieve not immediately but perhaps after a long time since the passing of a loved one. It all depends on what goes on in a given moment. Thus, grief is a natural response to a sorrowful reality. This is why we must be attentive to anyone who cries at any time because we can never understand what the deceased meant to that person. On the contrary, we must avoid being like that indifferent boy, whose hatred for his father went to the extent of suppressing his emotions with an irrational excuse for not attending the funeral. Many families have people like that boy, and it is very dangerous, not to the family, but to such individuals. When one replaces pity, pain, sorrow and mourning with excuses flowing from hatred for the dead person, the one who needs to be pitied is not the dead but the indifferent living person. In case you are like that boy, please make amends for your indifference. Listen to the voice of your conscience and repent.

If Jesus our Brother who understands our sorrows has said that blessed are those who mourn for they shall be comforted (see Matt 5:4), he is inviting us to comfort those who are bereaved and give them hope which come from Him. Imagine then the opposite of this Beatitude: Woe to those who lack compassion, for they shall receive no compassion. This would be the implication. Jesus invites us to rise from the attitude of indifference to that of conversion of heart. Even if the dead offended us while alive, let the grief of their family and loved ones move us to forgiveness. If we lack compassion, how do we expect others to be compassionate to our family when we die? Rachel, our Biblical ancestor in Ramah (see Jeremiah 31:15-19), reminds us that God is our Comforter, yet He invites us to extend His comfort to others. Repent from indifference and return to compassion. This is how to mourn with those grieving.
